1. Background

A. Selection of ChildFund’s new vision and establishment of 2019–2021 mid/long–term strategy

- As the ‘Representative Child Advocacy Organization’ in 2018, ChildFund set a new vision and has established the strategic direction ‘to support the growth of children and create a child–friendly environment based on children’s rights’.
- To realize strategic direction 1 ‘Create child–friendly impact’, the strategic task ‘strengthen children’s rights–based project implementation capability’ was established, and detailed tasks 1) right’s–based paradigm conversion, 2) rights–based project application and strengthening were selected.

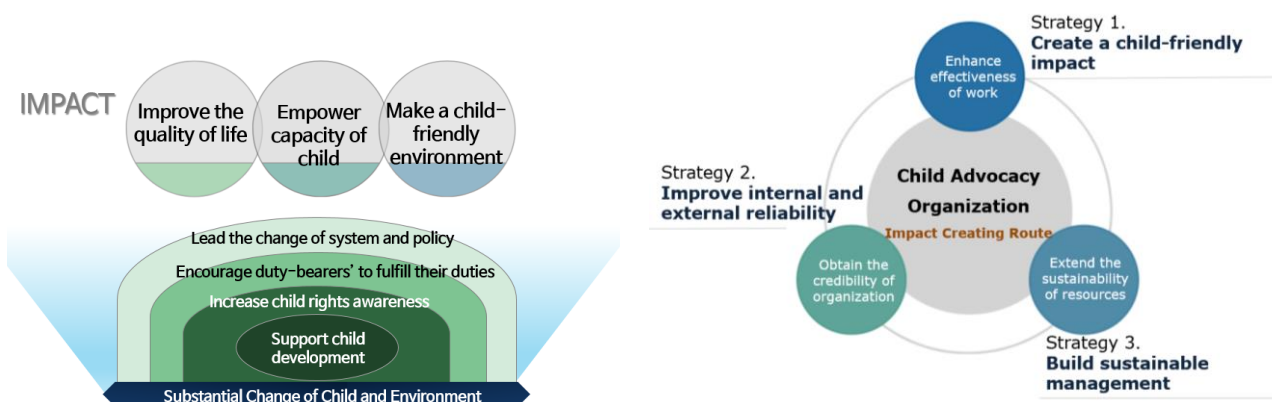


Image 1. Representative child advocacy organization Roadmap

B. Promotion of human rights–based project application in accordance with KOICA's promotion of human rights management

- KOICA announced an innovation roadmap including 'Human Rights Centered' in 2018, and is promoting human rights centered organization and project operation by declaring the Human Rights Management Charter.
- As of 2019, human rights management guidelines are in the final stages of preparation. After the guidelines are established, KOICA plans to educate KOICA employees on understanding of human rights–based projects and promote human rights–based projects in KOICA projects, including public–private partnership projects.

○Therefore, KOICA has plans to expand human rights management within development cooperation projects by applying human rights-based project guidelines to partner organizations (NGOs, corporations, consultant organizations, etc.).

- ▶ Due to increasing need internally and externally for implementation of international development project based on (children's) rights, this pilot project promotion plan was established to convert ChildFund's overseas project approach to rights-based in the long-term.

2. Details

A. Purpose

- To identify lessons learnt from project/organizational aspects through the pilot projects, and apply them when establishing framework for children's rights-based projects
- To develop a practical policy, guideline and framework, after first experiencing actual project research, planning, monitoring, and evaluation based on internal studies and existing data, rather than establishing ChildFund guideline or framework first and then applying them to individual projects

B. Expected Outcome

- Understanding the child rights-based project system and capabilities of each partner institution
- Improving the understanding of the ChildFund's internal children's rights-base
- Identifying effective ChildFund application methods when establishing a framework based on children's rights and promoting projects
- Identifying challenges in promoting children's rights-based projects and seeking cooperation tasks with partner organizations

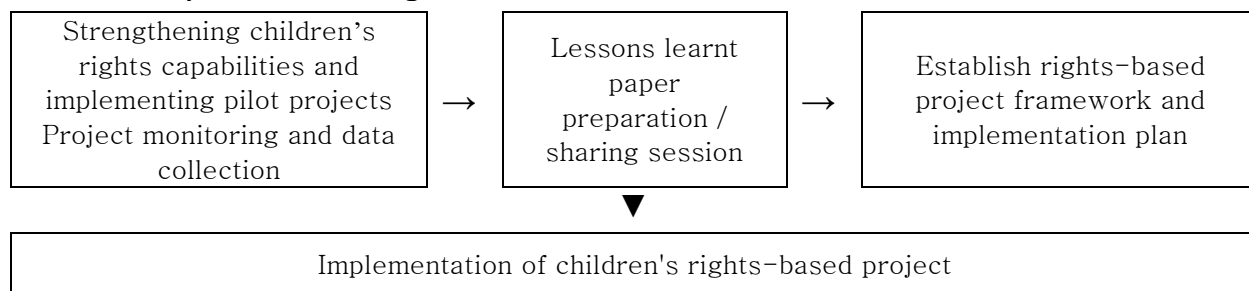
C. Target countries and partner institutions

Operated in 3 countries: Philippines (Educo), Burkina Faso (CCFC), Nepal (ChildFund Japan).

<p style="text-align: center;">Note</p>	<p>After introducing child rights-based programming in 2015, Educo has fully institutionalized the program by including it in the 2016–2019 national strategy book.</p> <p>The Philippines office was recommended by Spain as a place with high expertise in child rights-based projects.</p> <p>ChildFund is currently only conducting disaster risk-reduction projects with Educo Philippines. There have been no discussions on the linkage of development projects (funds) with Educo Philippines after this pilot project.</p>	<p>Each partner institution has not yet adopted a children's rights-based approach, but is interested in it.</p> <p>We expect that these institutions can try various methods possible and jointly learn with ChildFund.</p> <p>As a donor organization, we want to determine how ChildFund will work with partner institutions that do not use a child rights-based approach in the future, and what support or policies are needed.</p>

D. Final Output

1) Lessons learnt paper

- Summary of lessons learned and implications from the perspective of the project (for each of the planning-implementation-finish phases) and from the perspective of the organization/people
- Include the issues when conducting CRP projects with partner institutions and points of improvement from the perspective of policies and projects in the future, taking into consideration ChildFund's nature as a donor institution

E. Detailed Activity (Strengthen capabilities / establish project base)

1) CRP study and periodic meeting between Project Team and Planning Team managers

- Purpose: Enhance understanding of children's rights-based projects and share project experiences between managers
- Key contents:
 - November 2019 ~ January 2020, CRP pre-study once a week
 - Review documents related to the topic. The manager shall summarize it in two A4 paper and present.
 - After the pre-study finishes, share the lessons learnt by each projects manager through periodic quarterly meetings.

○ Periodic meeting between the working-level staff of the Planning Team and the Cooperative Project Team

- Frequency: Once a month
- Key activities: Share project progress
Investigate the rights-based project management tool and carry out pilot-application

2) Support for pilot project research, planning, monitoring and evaluation

○Purpose: Lessons learned and joint learning of children’s rights-based projects through close collaboration between the Planning Team and the Project Team

○Key contents:

- 1 manager from each of the Project Team and the Planning Team shall work together in a group.
- For the Philippines project, two managers from the Planning Team shall jointly be responsible in order to learn Educo’s CRP process.
- For Burkina Faso and Nepal, the Planning Team managers shall divide into a main/supporting role in order to share experience and ensure the consistency of the feedback details.

- The Planning Team manager performs the following supporting tasks step by step for the three pilot projects. The duties of the project manager throughout the entire project management process are the same as before.
- As the expected outcome of the pilot project is different for each country, detailed activities and roles may be added or reduced by country.

※ As the Project Team manager is responsible for managing the pilot project, communication with the local area shall mainly be responsible by the Project Team.

During the pilot project, continuous communication between the two teams is essential, such as developing a project management tool and sharing the status on a regular basis.

3. Future Task

- After the pilot project is complete, a framework containing the core principles and action plans for the children's rights-based approach will be established based on the lessons learnt paper (2022).
- Based on this, policy and project tasks required for the transition to CRP, such as development of CRP guidelines, revision of proposal form, revision of monitoring and evaluation tools, revision of indicators, and development of educational contents for the ChildFund project managers and partner organizations, will be carried out.
- Full transition to children's rights-based and plans for application will be finalized after the pilot project is complete.
